Rules for Writing a Good Essay

What Makes a Good Essay?

It aims to persuade readers of an idea based on evidence.

It should answer a question or task.

It should have a thesis statement and an argument.

It should present or discuss something: develop a thesis via a set of closely related points by reasoning and evidence.

It should include relevant examples, supporting evidence, and information from academic texts or other credible sources.



The Golden Rules of Essay Writing

- 1: Stick to the topic; relevance is essential.
- 2: Make sure to identify the keywords to focus on when planning the essay.
- 3: Make a paragraph by paragraph plan that
- 4: Avoid waffling in the opening paragraph;

3: presents a developing argument to the topic.

5: Spend the rest of the first paragraph outlining the ground you intend to cover in the essay.

7: Use linking words at the beginning of paragraphs to help readers follow the development of the essay.
Common linking words:
nevertheless, furthermore, thus, however, consequently, similarly

9: All sources must be clearly identified either in the body of the essay or in the footnotes.

4: Avoid waffling in the opening paragraph, focus immediately on the given topic.

6: Make one point in each subsequent paragraph using a topic sentence. Develop the paragraph with close textual reference and end it with a summary or a link to the next paragraph.

8: The concluding paragraph must return to the topic or issue that was raised at the first part of the essay and draw a conclusion.

10: Check the essay for proper grammar and spelling. Iron out typos and other common writing errors.

Steps to Writing an Essay

Peculiar Features of Essays:

Essays have no limits for subjects.

Any topic can be disclosed within the frames of an essay without compromise to value and meaning.

They are short.

There is no room for excessive and unnecessary information.



They have a strict structure.

Logical organization adds to the essay's easy comprehension.

They have no limits for methods of analysis.

Essays can be written on the basis of any scientific approach or method.

Steps in Writing an Essay



Research

Begin the essay writing process by researching your topic. Utilize the Internet, the academic databases, and the library.



Analysis

Clearly define the claims and write out the reasons and evidence. Look for the weaknesses and strengths of logic.



Brainstorming

Your essay will require insights of your own. Ask yourself a dozen questions and answer them.



Thesis

Your thesis is your main point, summed up in a concise sentence that lets the reader know where you're going, and why.



Introduction

Now, sit down and write the essay. The introduction should grab the reader's attention, set up the issue, and lead in to your thesis.



Outline

Sketch out your essay before writing it out. Map out the

Paragraphs

Each paragraph should be focused on a single idea that supports your thesis. Begin paragraphs with topic sentences, support assertions with evidence, and expound your ideas in the clearest, most sensible way you can.



Writing tip: Map out the structure of your argument, and make sure each paragraph is unified.

Conclusion

Gracefully exit your essay by making a quick wrap-up sentence. End on some memorable thought, perhaps a quotation, or an interesting twist of logic, or some call to action.



Style

All borrowed ideas and quotations should be correctly cited in the body of your text, followed up with a Works Cited (references) page listing the details of your sources.

Language

You're not done writing your essay until you've polished your language by correcting the grammar, making sentences flow, incorporating rhythm, putting emphasis on important points, adjusting the formality, giving it a level-headed tone, and making other intuitive edits. Proofread until it reads just how you want it to sound.



Common Mistakes in Essays

NEVER

Content Mistakes to Avoid:

- write an essay, in which the content does not reflect and develop the real topic.
- write an essay without an introduction.
- write an essay without a thesis.
- write a thesis statement that lacks ideas.
- use ideas that you cannot prove with examples.
- write an essay without a conclusion.


